

CHRONOLOGY 2019-2020

2019

VFUA completes long-term investigation into umpiring payments and employment status over last five years and raises a number of issues with the the AFL.

10 October

VFUA Executive prepares to employ an advocate for upcoming F&C negotiations. Ultimately none appointed and President, Matthew

Mahoney handles much of the negotiation with AFL.

16 October

AFL responds to umpiring payment issues raised by VFUA and agrees to voluntarily make a supplementary payment to identified umpires.

17 October

VFUA forwards proposal to outsource some administration to AFLUA. AFLUA unable to undertake services for VFUA at that point in time.

8 November

Paul Rebeschini (F), Sam Stagg (B) and Simon Plumridge (G) promoted to

AFL lists.

13 November

Active umpires receive supplementary payment from the AFL in relation to umpire payment issues identified by the VFUA. Non-active umpires receive payment on 4 December.

13 December

AFL forwards initial F&C proposal to VFUA. For the first time an agreement includes payment for training proposal and a statement that AFL had investigated and determined umpires were part-time and not

casual employees.

15 December

VFUA AGM postponed as the result of no quorum.

31 December

The first public message on the pandemic from Wuhan Health Commission.

2020

14 January

VFUA responds to AFL F&C proposal with questions and suggested revisions as part of the ongoing negotiation process.

14-22 January

VFL umpire training resumes.

25 January

First COVID19 case reported in Australia.

29 January

VFUA holds postponed AGM. F&C proposal presented to members. Generally positive response from members. Various member queries answered or forwarded to AFL.

12 February President meets wi

President meets with AFL to discuss F&C proposal. **1 March**

First reported COVID19 death in Australia.

2 March

AFL forwards draft contract to VFUA for comment.

16 March

Victorian government declares a state of emergency until 13 April. The State of emergency which was subsequently extended. Restrictions on

particular activities and self-isolation begins.

17 March

President finalises negotiations accepting AFL offer and signs MOU for 2020 season to be distributed to umpires.

Start of VFL, VFLW, NAB League Boys & Girls competitions postponed. **22 March**

AFL suspends season to 31 May. AFLW season cancelled.

26 March

VFL umpires stood down indefinitely. Training payments to that stage forwarded to umpires per F&C agreement.

CHRONOLOGY 2019-2020

30 March

Australian government announces its largest economic support package in response to the crisis, "JobKeeper" wage subsidy program.

2 April

AFL confirms that, as part-time employees, VFL umpires will be eligible

for JobKeeper payments.

17 April

Following a request from the AFL, VFUA splits funding for services of Greg Buck as psychologist for remainder of season with AFL.

4 May

VFUA begins six-week Virtual Mini-Oympics for Paul Anderson Memorial Shield.

20 May

VFUA agrees to change in fees for any competition matches officiated in 2020; noting without prejudice for 2021.

24 May

VFUA halves membership fee for 2020 season. Almost 100% of potential members join.

11 June

AFL season resumes with Round 2.

14 June

SDS/Development Boundary Umpires claim victory in Virtual Mini-Olympics.

7 July

Victorian government announces that metropolitan Melbourne and Mitchell Shire would re-enter lockdown for a minimum of six weeks from 12 a.m.

9 July

AFL clubs leave Victoria for interstate hubs to complete the season outside Victoria.

19 July

Victorian government announces that "face coverings" were to be made mandatory in metropolitan Melbourne and Mitchell Shire when residents leave their home.

21 July

Proposal that NAB competitions would begin in regional Victoria shortly.

2 August

A state of disaster was declared in Victoria from 6pm. Restrictions tightened including a curfew across Melbourne from 8pm to 5am starting immediately. Melbourne moved to stage 4 and regional Victoria to stage 3 restrictions.

4 August

AFL confirms VFL, VFLW, NAB League Boys & Girls competitions cancelled for 2020.

19 August

AFL announces merger of VFL-NEAFL competitions for 2021 with AFL teams to field their own team, align with an existing team or spread players over various existing teams. Stand-alone VFL clubs to decide own future in new competition.

1 September

VFUA launches Team of the Decade polling via dedicated Facebook page.

3 September

VFUA hosts first virtual Zoom Q&A mental health and wellbeing session with VFL psychologist Greg Buck with continued and recurring sessions agreed to be held in the future.

31 October

JobKeeper payments for AFL umpires cease at end of contract period.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Well... season 2020 was interesting. I would like to start off with a personal message for all our members. There are some of you who may feel like you have found other interests in 2020 that you enjoy outside of umpiring and are considering packing away the boots for 2021. Admittedly, I have a similar feeling

and they are not alone. I urge you to reflect on all the good times they have had umpiring and the benefits it has brought to your life before making any rash decisions. There is no harm in returning for at least a couple of weeks of training to make sure that you have made the right decision. Now - let's go back in time to December 2019. It was at this time, through working closely with the AFL, the VFUA received the first draft of the 2020 fees and conditions agreement for Victorian state league umpires.

This was a landmark achievement for the VFUA as it included the following conditions:

• Payment for official on-site training sessions for umpires (i.e. at Victoria Park)

• A determination that umpires were part-time employees of the AFL (and the associated entitlements and employment rights that come with this determination)

Unfortunately it wasn't all good news for the VFUA in December 2019. We were planning to hold our AGM on the 15 December, however due to poor member attendance we were unable to achieve a quorum and therefore our AGM was postponed to 30 January 2020. The postponed AGM was successfully held at the Yarra Hotel (just up the road from Victoria Park) on a Thursday night after field and boundary umpire training. There was a strong attendance from our members on this night. The VFUA will learn from this and look to hold future AGMs at convenient times and locations for our umpires, such as after training. With this being said, at the time of writing this report we are currently exploring COVID-safe alternatives for holding our AGM which include virtual options. After receiving member feedback at the AGM, the VFUA continued to work together with the AFL to finalise the fees and conditions agreement for 2020. I would like to thank Michael Jennings (AFL Field Umpire Coach), Amy Adams (AFL People Business Partner) and Grant Williams (AFL Head of Umpiring) for their assistance in this process as well as our ongoing communication throughout the year.

COVID-19

In late March we had the NAB League Girls season in progress and other competitions poised to begin in the upcoming weeks. There was excitement brewing within the umpiring fraternity regarding list announcements and what 2020 had in store. A few days later and everything changed with the VFL/VFLW/ NAB League competitions all postponed as a result of the COVID-19 health crisis. It was disappointing to see many of my umpiring friends have their hard work over the pre-season squandered. The postponement occurred prior to umpiring squads being announced, and as such, many umpires who had positioned themselves to be promoted to the senior squad were unable to realise this achievement. Additionally, invite-for-trial umpires who had trained ferociously all pre-season never found out whether they had "made the list". I encourage these umpires to put this frustration behind them and approach 2021 with renewed hunger and a fresh perspective. The virus forced the VFUA to move guickly, and the first hoop to jump through was navigating the federal government's JobKeeper payment and how this would apply to our umpires. The key feature of the 2020 fees and conditions agreement was that for the first time in history state league Victorian umpires were officially recognised as part-time employees of the AFL. Therefore, as part-time employees, our umpires were eligible to receive the JobKeeper payment. This was a terrific result and helped alleviate the financial pressures felt by many of our members who saw their employment outside of umpiring significantly affected. I would like to commend the AFL for their clear and swift action administrating the JobKeeper payment.

Throughout the March to July period, there was a lot of uncertainty

regarding whether the VFL/VFLW/NAB League seasons would resume. To fill this void and continue a tradition that begun in 2001, whilst we were not able to physically hold a Mini-Olympics at umpire training, the VFUA held a "virtual" Mini-Olympics. Running over six weeks this event was a success in keeping umpires engaged and raised over \$2,000 for the Cancer Council. Refer to the Mini-Olympics section of this report for further information. As we know, ultimately in early August the VFL/VFLW/NAB League seasons were officially cancelled for 2020. This was saddening, however at least it gave our umpires certainty for the rest of the year after many months of hoping and waiting. The AFL restructure brought on by COVID-19 has seen the departure of Victorian State League Umpiring Head Coach Cameron Nash and also Operations Manager Peter Mair. Both of these men have made a significant contribution to Victorian umpiring and we wish them all the best for the future.

VFUA Members

I would like to congratulate 2019 VFUA members Paul Rebeschini (field), Sam Stagg (boundary) and Simon Plumridge (goal) who were promoted to the AFL list for the 2020 season. A fantastic achievement that confirms Victoria's status as the strongest state league umpiring group in Australia. Once again Victorian umpires featured prominently in the 2020 AFLW season. There were 12 field umpires, 12 boundary umpires and 11 goal umpires from Victoria on the AFLW umpiring squad. Well done to all involved. The VFUA executive made a decision to cut our membership fees from \$220 to \$100 this year due to COVID-19. It was humbling to see that 99% of umpires joined the VFUA - thank you for your support. This year the VFUA stepped up its partnership with VFL psychologist Greg Buck as COVID-19 related issues reared their head. Greg has provided a tremendous amount of mental wellbeing support for our umpires over the years and this year was no exception. Greg is always contactable for any of our umpires who wished to seek individual support. The VFUA hosted two Q&A sessions via online video conferencing with Greg and our members which explored mindfulness and coping with the loss of motivation in our lives brought on by COVID-19. Thanks for your support Greg and the VFUA looks forward to continuing to work with you in the future.

This year it has been fantastic to work with everyone involved on the

VFUA Executive. My first year as president has been a unique ride, and I would not have got through it without their support. I have received a lot of credit this year for work that was not even done by me! My email and Facebook updates are the results of discussions and ideas from everyone in the Executive team. The track representatives: Peter Bailes, Dylan Fulton, Greta Miller, Melissa Sambrooks, Tayla Manning and Ken Mitchell. You would all be sick of my group messages! I commend you all for the work you have done communicating with your individual squads and being the "people in the trenches" from which we are able to gauge umpire feedback. A special thanks goes to Melissa Sambrooks who has completed four years of service as a track rep and played a crucial role in the virtual Mini-Olympics, and to Peter Bailes for his love of telephone calls and checking in with umpires.

My vice-presidents Liam Pain and Yip Wong. Liam has done a superb job establishing our relationship with VFL psychologist Greg Buck and organising brand new VFUA polo tops. Yip – you have totally transformed the online presence of the VFUA and always go above and beyond in your work. David Flegg AM for his work as the VFUA historian and statistician (including the preparation of this annual report). This year's annual report is looking better than ever – I would also like to thank senior goal umpire James Rizio for his assistance in redesigning and modernising the report. Last but not least I would like to thank VFUA Administrator Peter Kelly (PK) for all the work that he does behind the scenes with partners, surveys, awards, life members and advice.

On a personal level, PK has been an invaluable mentor and sounding board for me when I am dealing with not only umpiring but other general life issues. Peter has decided to retire from his role with the VFUA. He has been involved with the association since its inception in 1992 and guided it through 28 seasons of relationships with various administrations. Peter, your experience on a day to day basis will be sorely missed but as a life member, Special Award recipient and friend to so many over generations of umpires you will always be a part of the VFUA.

Whilst 2020 has been very challenging, I hope that everybody has been able to find the positives out of the ever-changing situation. I hope to see everyone back next year!

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT Peter Kelly



After 28 years being involved with the VFUA, it is now time for me to move on and focus on my role at the AFLUA whilst letting others shape the association going forward. Whilst I was wanting to finish up a couple of years ago, I was determined to stay until we finalised some employment issues with the AFL. This included recognition that umpires are employees and deserve rights and entitlements that come with it. In March this year, the VFUA agreed to the AFL's proposal that umpires be employed as part-time employees of the AFL.

Little did we know the drama that would soon unfold with the arrival of Covid-19 and the associated disruptions this caused to our football competitions. However, as employees our members accessed entitlements they'd never had before and were paid for attendance at pre-season training and were eligible for the federal government's JobKeeper program.

I, along with David 'Fleggy' Flegg AM, have been part of the VFUA since its inception in 1992. We have worked alongside some magnificent people who have built the association up to what it is today. The association has supported umpires in so many ways and it has been great to see so many umpires achieve success at both VFL and AFL level over so many years.

That's not to say we haven't experienced some difficult challenges along the way however I am now confident that with the umpiring department now part of the AFL structure, our umpires are in good hands and will benefit from this alignment into the future. I have served many executive committees with their different leaders and participants in different structures with everchanging priorities.

I have seen some great leaders and executive members, all of whom have shared a common purpose of helping make the umpiring experience a more positive and professional experience for all. I have also been part of many planning weekends that have led to some pretty harsh hangover induced planning sessions with lots of wild stories and exploits from the night before.

Our 2020 executive team signed on, not knowing what lay ahead. As a team, they have worked tirelessly to keep members engaged and communication timely and informative, during unprecedent times. I would like to thank Peter Howe who has provided valuable assistance and advice over many years whilst CEO of the AFLUA. 2019 LIFE MEMBERS

Nick Brown

Nick has been a long standing VFUA member and has continued to support the VFUA even after being promoted to the AFL.

He has umpired over 50 games for both the VFL and AFL and has accomplished many achievements in his career – the 2011 TAC Cup Grand Final and 2014 and 2017 VFL Grand Finals. Nick has also shown amazing resilience; having been on the AFL list in 2015-2016 he was sent back to the VFL at the end of 2016, and worked extremely hard in 2017 to again umpire his second VFL grand final and was promoted back to the AFL where he has remained since 2018.

Further to his umpiring achievements, Nick has also been a great contributor to the VFUA. He has been a member each year he has been on the VFL list as well as most notably taking on the role of Vice President in 2017. He has also contributed to the VFUA as track representative in 2011 and assisted in delivering a number of great initiatives. After being promoted to AFL, Nick has continued to help the VFUA by assisting with the VFUA Ball in 2018 as well as continuing to assist with the banking from 2017 to 2020.

Nick has always displayed high qualities both on and off the field. He is well respected amongst the umpiring community and continues to be a great mentor to many VFL umpires.

Simon Plumridge

If there were an award for the VFL Umpire of the Decade just gone, your judgement would come into serious question to not confer the honour to Simon Plumridge.

Since arriving from the Eastern Football League in 2011, Simon, from a pure numbers perspective, has umpired 151 VFL games (21st on the all-time list and 9th for goal umpires), a record 22 VFL Finals and 4 VFL Grand Finals also a record - with 5 state-level Grand Finals in the last 6 seasons. In doing so, Simon has achieved everything there is to achieve at state level, umpiring both a state game (2016) and the National Under 18 Championships (2018) and being awarded Goal Umpire of the Year in both 2015 and 2018.

However, this only paints half the picture of Simon's decade-long record of excellence, as everything that counts cannot necessarily be counted - that is, his qualities of leadership, helpfulness, humility, determination and resilience.

Universally respected among the goal umpiring squad, Simon has been a leader in an official capacity, both as a track rep and also as voted on each year by his peers.

Unofficially, Simon sets a fine example on the track working hard away from Vic Park and, on Wednesdays, being light-hearted but still 100% focussed on the session, always running the warm-up laps on the outside of the group and not hesitating to take a less experienced goalie aside during skills to impart some of his wisdom and experience.

It is this quiet example with which Simon commands - not demands - the respect of his peers, usually letting his actions do the talking for himself. Therefore, when 'Simon says' something, you know it's something of value.

I believe that the one year in the last six that Simon hasn't umpired a Grand Final, however, actually best sums him up - that is, 2016. That year Simon encountered serious injury - rupturing his ACL. Despite his personal disappointment, this didn't stop him from attending training on crutches, taking part in what he could and generally being his usual supportive self. When Simon did return, astonishingly, he resumed outrunning everyone on the track before too long - and, of course, he's gone on to umpire the last three VFL grand final since then as well.

To finish, if an up and coming goal umpire were to ask how to go about things the right way, Simon Plumridge would be the person I'd hold up as the example for them.

A person of Simon's calibre in our presence over the course of the decade - and, for his long service to both umpiring and the association, make him an outstanding candidate for life membership.

Andrew Leggo

Andrew Leggo joined the VFL in 2009 and quickly become part of the furniture around Vic Park. Although knowing nobody and being the slowest bloke on the track when he arrived, he turned that around quickly, becoming most umpire's favourite bloke to run with on the weekend.

Throughout his 117 senior game career, including two VFL finals, five TAC cup finals, five VFL reserve finals and the 2014 VFL Reserves Grand Final, Andrew created and contributed to a culture of camaraderie, teamwork and enjoyment around the boundary squad, which is the reason he was given the role of skipper for a number of years.

Andrew prided himself on getting to know the new umpires on the list and was often seen as one of the most approachable umpires to go to whether for advice or just a general chat about life.

When Andrew was attending a VFUA event (which he

rarely, if ever, missed) everyone knew the event was going to be enjoyable. Furthermore, you'll often see the boundaries wearing his vibrant singlets or his awesome jumpers promoting his lawn mowing business. Not to mention his #TuesdayTip on Instagram.

After a disappointing departure from the VFL in 2018, which left him without a farewell game, the boundaries felt he deserved a proper send off, with all the boundary umpires gathering at Victoria Park during the off-season to see off the great man which showed just how highly he was regarded.

Andrew was a staple of the boundary umpires' group with this year being the first year without him at the track since he started and there was an obvious change.

Leggo created the culture around the VFUA that the current exec team strives to recreate. He is truly worthy of life membership.

Dean Jones

Dean Jones is one of the VFUA's quiet achievers. In a recently completed 18-year career he has quietly achieved an awful lot.

On the field he began with the VFUA in 2002 making his senior VFL debut the following year. In the ensuing 17 seasons he compiled a remarkable goal umpiring record 207 VFL, 75 VFL Reserves, 65 TAC Cup, 2 VFLW and 19 other matches outside the regular VFL competitions. Spread amongst those were 5 VFL finals and the 2005, 2010 and 2013 VFL Reserves Grand Finals.

His VFL match total is second only to Peter Balding as a goal umpire and third overall in the VFL. As a result, he achieved life membership of the VFL in 2018.

As a goal umpire Dean was an umpire a coach could rely on to be in position and get things right. He was passionate about his umpiring and always available. While not the speediest or most athletic on the track there was no more determined umpire on the list. He gave of his best at every session and in every match - no exceptions.

Off the field Dean also contributed to the VFUA. As a track representative in 2006-2007 he looked after the interests of the senior goal umpires' squad and was involved in Executive Committee business. Rare would be the occasion when Dean was not at a VFUA social function.

What Dean meant to his VFUA colleagues informs us more of his character. Dean was highly respected within the umpiring group. When he spoke, others listened.

At training, Dean was one to watch and learn from. He offered advice and friendly analysis when asked. On gameday, Dean set an example to follow in his preparation and game performance.

Dean was an outstanding umpire for many years at the VFL and a contributor to the VFUA and to his colleagues over almost two decades. He thoroughly deserves the award of life membership.



NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2020

1. The special purpose financial report has been prepared for distribution to the members to satisfy the accountability requirements under the entity's constitution. The accounting policies used in the preparation of this report are consistent with previous years and are described below:

a. The financial report has been prepared on a cash basis of accounting including the historical cost convention and the ongoing concern assumption

b.The requirements of Australian Accounting Standards promulgated by the accounting profession do not have mandatory applicability to the Victorian Football Umpires' Association Inc. in relation to the year ended 30th September because the entity is not a 'reporting entity' as defined therein.

The requirements of Statements of Accounting Concepts promulgated by the accounting profession also apply only to 'reporting entities'. These requirements have been complied with only to the extent that they coincide with the basis of accounting described in this note.

2. The Corporations Act 2001 (Cth) Section 307 categorises the Victorian Football Umpires' Association Inc. as a 'Tier 1' entity as revenue is less than \$250,000. Therefore, neither an audit nor a review is required to be conducted by ASIC.




